Hosta of the Year 2020 'Dancing Queen'



'Dancing Queen' emerges bright yellow and remains yellow all season long. The large leaves have a prominent pie crust edge, adding even more pizzazz to this colorful hosta. In mid to late summer, the foliage lightens to soft yellow and the clump is topped with pale lavender flowers.

#### SPRING WILDFLOWERS

Last issue I highlighted some of the spring bulbs and perennials that we enjoy in our gardens. Because the property we have was heavily wooded and we cleared just enough to grow the hostas in pots, we are able to enjoy many of the spring ephemerals and other native and not-so-native wildflowers. With the help of The Ohio State University, here are a few.



One of Ohio's prettiest spring ephemerals, spring beauty (Claytonia virginica) begins blooming in late March and is dormant by June. The delicate pink or white five-petaled flowers of the spring beauty are only about a half-inch in width, but they can be seen carpeting the floor of rich woods throughout the state. Its flowers, which only open in sunlight, are often found flourishing amid the forest floor's brown, leaf-litter. Native Americans often ate the spring beauty's small, starchy tubers. Its carpet of pink and white blooms is a common sight at many state nature preserves

(These beauties carpet several areas of our yard.)



Large white trillium (Trillium grandiflorum), also known as great white trillium, blooms in April. Large white trillium was dubbed the official Ohio wildflower in 1987. The plant is most commonly found growing in the understory of rich deciduous upland temperate forests. When this trillium blooms the petals start out white and slowly turn pink as they age. Trilliums are long lived plants; large white trillium can live for 25 years and it may take more than 3 years before the flowers are ready to bloom. This spectacular plant can be found in all of Ohio's 88 counties.

(Trillium are probably my favorite here in NE Ohio. We have the red {sometimes called Wake Robin} and a yellow leaf form that I bought at a sale at the Holden Arboretum. Seller said he didn't have any Trillium, so I said, "I will take one of these and one of those".) Plants were legal.



Virginia Blue Bells. This unique wildflower has interesting blue trumpet-shaped flowers. Before the bell-shaped flowers unfurl, a small cluster of pink buds form, eventually turning into the recognizable flower. This is a large wildflower, reaching up to 2 feet in height with large light green leaves. Floodplain and mesic woodlands are both ideal environments for this plant. The flowers develop quickly so be best time to see it would be during springtime as soon as frost isn't a threat. Native Americans used this plant to treat whooping cough, tuberculosis, and the root was used to treat venereal diseases.

(One that I planted in my yard, They are easy to grow and do not disappoint.)



This common spring ephemeral heralds the end of winter across Ohio's forests and woodlands. The golden blossoms of **yellow trout-lily** (*Erythronium americanum*) flourish in early April. Although you'll find thousands of plants carpeting the ground, only a few flower each year. Its leaves range from mottled to occasionally all green. The troutlily's bulbs are often deep in the ground and produce many off-shoots. This six to 10 inch tall plant is also called dog's -tooth violet, although it is not a true violet.

(This little guy has appeared and disappeared in my yard. I don't know how it gets there, but I can't seem to get it to stay.)



One of Ohio's late spring woodland wildflowers, wild geranium (Geranium maculatum) blooms from April until June. It grows best in rich woodland soil. Geranium is derived from an old Greek name, geranos (crane), referring to the similarity of the fruit to a crane's bill. The deeply cleft leaves are rather distinctive. A hearty wildflower, wild geraniums have large rhizomes, or underground stems, to sustain them. Native Americans dug up the rhizomes, and after drying them, ground them up to slow blood flow from wounds and cure sore throats. It has a pinkish flower.

Unlike the zonal, annual geraniums that belong to the <u>Pelargonium</u> genus, cranesbills are true geraniums that thrive in U.S.

(These grow almost like weeds at times.)



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
